# VP's Corner

Well.

I spent June learning about clutches & dire clutches. When you replace a slave cylinder on an MGB, replace the actuating rod too. It doesn't take much wear to not allow the clutch to disengage fully, resulting in having to admit the shifting problems are not due to your spouse's alleged rusty driving skills. With a lever long enough you can move the world, but a tad too short and/or wobbly and moving in reverse becomes a challenging option. The same goes for curved levers. The original TD design had a cable operating link to actuate the clutch, which was soon changed to a rod system. This set up works like a champ until the system begins to wear, at which point the rods and linkages begin to interfere with each other and the formerly straight rods go 'S' shaped and compound the problem. You might expect a modern 5-speed conversion to circumvent this issue, but you would be disappointed - Fixes, corrections and accommodations proceed apace...

So June wrapped up with a proper fish & chips after an enlightening visit to two local locations of some significance in the struggle for Colonial Independence. I'll let others describe the event, which had a good turnout of British vehicles despite being rescheduled from a much cooler time of year. I particularly enjoyed having the tour of these places so close following Carolina Day, June 28. This day has been celebrated in Charleston since 1777, initially with bell-ringing, and more recently with a small parade and celebratory cannon-fire. These efforts commemorate the very unexpected defeat of the British Fleet attempting to pass an unassuming palmetto log fortification at the mouth of Charleston harbor. After this first clear and undeniable victory by Colonial forces, their leadership felt confident enough to autograph certain documents committing them to insurrection on July 4. So as we curtail club activities for the heat of summer, I leave you with this tidbit off the 'interwebs':


### History Drive




## History Drive

From there we headed to Goose Creek to see the St James Episcopal Church. If you didn't make this excursion and you would like to see it, well you need to get in touch with them ahead of time and arrange to have it opened. Built in the 1710s, it is one of South Carolina's oldest surviving buildings.







The royal coat of arms over the pulpit saved the church from destruction in 1779-1780 when British troops moved through South Carolina during the American Revolution.






#### 34th Annual British Car Day planning

# Pimms Ice Lollies

- 300ml/½ pint Pimms, or similar 'fruit cup'
- . 850ml/1½ pints lemonade
- handful fresh strawberries, hulled, halved
- few sprigs fresh mint, leaves only
- 1 orange, zest only
- 1. Mix the Pimms and lemonade together in a large jug.
- 2. Place a couple of strawberry halves, a few mint leaves and a little orange zest into each lolly mould.
- 3. Pour the Pimm mixture into each ice lolly mould until threequarters full. Insert the lolly stick and lid and freeze for 2-3 hours, or until frozen solid.
- 4. Alternatively, you can use large shot glasses as moulds: place the strawberry, mint and orange zest into the glass and fill with the Pimms mixture. Freeze for one hour, or until the lollies are partially frozen, then insert the lolly sticks and continue to freeze until completely frozen.
- 5. To remove the lollies, dip the moulds briefly in hot water and carefully remove the lollies.

There is your Windscreen editor/webmaster listening to John Twist, renown MG expert. He checked the timing of most of the cars he looked at, including mine. With the timing light set to 32 degrees before top dead center, the timing was set running at about 3500rpm with the vacuum advance disconnected. Mine needed a little adjustment. It does seem to have more power and rev higher, easier.
